



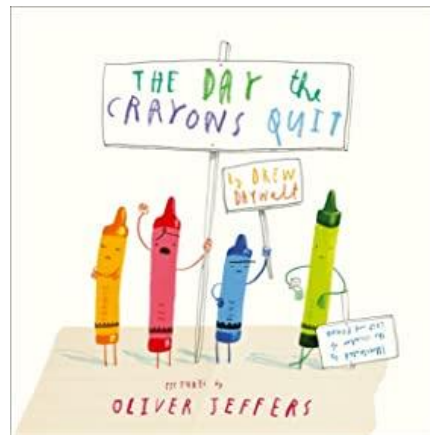
Home Learning

<p>Read 'The Day the Crayons Quit'. If you don't have this book, watch this: https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=489micE6eHU</p>	<p>Can you choose your favourite colour and write the names of different objects that are this colour? For example, yellow...banana</p> <p>Reception children could draw their objects.</p>	<p>Draw pictures of objects using very unusual colours (e.g. a blue strawberry, a green dog).</p>	<p>Design a new home to help the crayons relax after a busy day of work. You could use Lego, stickle bricks, junk modelling or anything you have available at home.</p>	<p>Can you use a painting software on a computer, laptop, iPad etc. to mix different colours together (on my laptop, it's called 'Paint') If you don't have this you could have a go at colour mixing with paints.</p>
<p>Do crayons sink or float? Can you find different objects around the house and see if they sink or float? Are they waterproof? How do you know?</p>	<p>Can you write a letter for a crayon and tell them why you like using that colour so much? An adult could scribe this for a Reception child.</p>	<p>Can you create your own colour wheel?  Instructions: https://www.craftprojectideas.com/learn-about-types-of-colors-with-a-color-wheel-craft/</p>	<p>Can you build your own crayon using junk modelling or other items?</p>	<p>How do you think a crayon would move? Do they roll, jump, waddle? Practise some different movements. You could make up a movement sequence or a 'crayon dance'.</p>

Year 1 children should write these words down. Discuss why you think they feel the way they do.</p>	<p>Create a picture that uses all of the colours in your crayon set... just like Duncan does. You can use pens, stick objects onto the paper or paint!</p>	<p>In the story, the crayons are given human-type features, but in a simple, cartoon-like way. Can you choose an object from your home and turn it into a cartoon figure? You could draw it or decorate the</p>	<p>Go on a colour hunt in your house. Make a list of all the items you have found and what colour they are. Reception could draw their items or ask a grown up to make a list.</p>

describe the process to your grown up. See if you can find anything else in your home which is made of wax.

actual object (ask a grown up first!)

Then count how many you have found for each colour. Which is the most/least popular colour in your house?

Ask an adult to research a colour poem with you on the internet. Read some together to find one you like and then learn it.

Write a story about a magic, multi-coloured crayon. What might happen to the person who uses it?
Reception children - ask a grown up to record you telling your story.
You might like to find a stick and use different coloured wools to wind around it in order to help you tell your story.



Can you attach a crayon to a long object (such as a ruler) and try to draw a picture? Be a 'Keep Going Kangaroo' - how could you attach the crayon? What will make it more secure? Try different long objects and see which works best.

After watching the video about how crayons are made can you build your own crayon factory out of Lego or Duplo? Below is an example.



In the book, white crayon talks about how he's useless by himself because he doesn't show up on most papers.
Use a white crayon to draw on white paper or card. Use watercolour paints to paint over the top of your drawing and see what happens.
