Theseus shouted cheerfully.

Adverbs can give us more information about adjectives (describing words).

The labyrinth is extremely dark.

#### Starter

Adverbs can modify whole clauses.

Quietly, the ship sailed on the sea.



What other adverbs could you use to modify the clause 'the ship sailed on the sea'?

#### Adverbial Phrases

We can also use phrases rather than single adverbs to modify clauses. These are called adverbial phrases. Adverbial phrases do not usually contain a verb.

For example:

The minotaur roared with excitement.

The minotaur roared in the labyrinth.

The minotaur roared like a lion.

Can you make your own adverbial phrase to modify this clause?

#### Fronted Adverbials

This is a complicated name for something very simple!

Sometimes an adverb or adverbial phrase can come before the verb instead of after.

For example:

The minotaur roared in the labyrinth.

Could be changed to:

In the labyrinth, the minotaur roared.

A comma always comes after a fronted adverbial.
